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Introduction

2020 is a very special year. The outbreak of the Covid19 pandemic changed the lifes of people all around the world. In many countries lockdowns took place, people lost their jobs or even relatives, travelling was not possible in the way we know it and many offers of social life were closed. Those are just a few examples of the many changes different people experienced in 2020.

In the cultural centre "Pegasus" in Senftenberg in the past years annually a international youth work camp took place. This year we had to cancel it because of the worldwide extraordinary situation. Also the entire house with its offers in the field of youth work had to close for several months. In this special times digital developments got in the focus of our daily work to keep in touch with the (local) youngsters. In this phase the idea of a digital workcamp growed.

In September of 2020 the digital workcamp started with young people from Mexico, Lebanon, Ukraine, Algeria and Romania. The moderation was settled in Germany. Together we got views into the world. In every one of our six meetings one of the participants prepared something about his/her country. We talked about the culture, the landscapes, typical food, stereotypes and of course about the extraordinary situation in the times of a pandemic.



To collect our results of those interesting contributions and honour the carefully prepared presentations of the participants we decided to create this little brochure. On the one hand the persons, which were part of the digital workcamp, have a memory of our two weeks together and can show a result what they did in this time. On the other hand we have the possibility to share our experiences and let other people know about young peoples lifes in different countries.

Mexico

Who are you and what are you doing?

Your ultimate tip when visiting your country/city?

Also visit Xochimilco.

What policies were set by the government to contain the Covid19-virus?

Well our president at the beginning he took it as a joke, he even said if we pray and we stay positive we wouldn't get the virus... so as you can imagine they didn't took preventive measures.

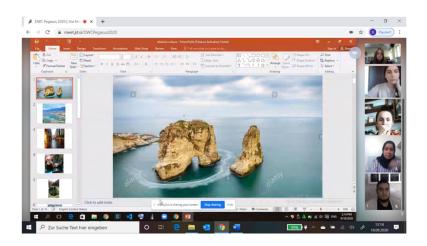
How has your daily life changed since the outbreak of the pandemic?

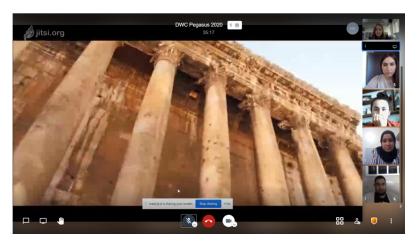

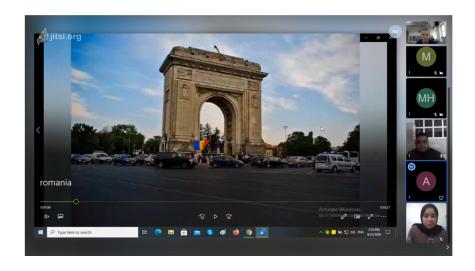
Are there special offers for young people e.g. like youth and cultural centre? What happened to offers of social work and specially youth work in the pandemic times?

Your ultimate tip when visiting your country/city?

When you visit Ukraine, be prepared to eat delicious food and have a good time. You should definitely visit western Ukraine in order to better get acquainted with Ukrainian culture and its traditions, the Carpathian Mountains and the Bukovel ski resort. You definitely need to visit the capital of Ukraine, dynamic and modern Kiev, the multifaceted and youth city of Kharkiv, and the picturesque city by the sea Odessa. You should also take a walk in Lviv, this city has the most western architecture of all the country's cities. It is a cozy city with a wide variety of restaurants and cool bars.

In Poland, you should definitely walk around Krakow it's a city of stunning architecture and fabulous cuisine. You should also visit the port city of Gdańsk or the developing

What policies were set by the government to contain the Covid19-virus?

In Poland and Ukraine, a decision was made to restrict tourism, and new rules for entry into the country were created.

Were there a lockdown in your country? What did/do you in this time?

Yes, the Polish government took certain measures and there was quarantine in Poland. During the quarantine, it was not possible to travel and spend days as before, so I decided to devote time to self-education. During the quarantine, many free courses were available, which I gladly passed and received a lot of new knowledge, began to learn a new language and spent a lot of time with my family.

At the moment, some centers are closed or switched to online work. On the other hand, with the pandemic, there are even more online projects and opportunities for young people to develop and communicate.

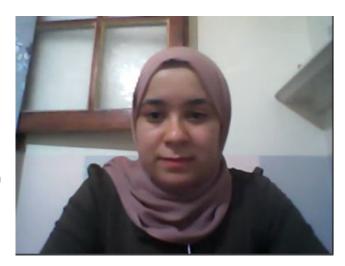
Algeria

So when you decide to visit Algeria, get yourself a local SIM card for internet data. WIFI is very limited, there are few cafes with wifi and if you are staying in a hotel it won't be fast, even the high end business hotels don't have the kind of wifi speeds you may be used to. The bonus of having data on your phone is that it will enable you to use an app like Google maps – with lack of printed maps and guidebooks available this if is your sure fire way to get around, and it means you can do things like check currency rates, train times etc, especially if language isn't your strong point.

You will encounter French and Arabic so either brush up on these languagea (if you can!) or be prepared to communicate with hands or seek out someone who can help you who speaks English. Mostly broken English is spoken, but some people speak fluently and others just won't speak it at all.

What policies were set by the government to contain the Covid19-virus?

The Algerian authorities decided to take precautionary measures to tighten restrictions on travel and movement to contain the outbreak of the Coronavirus, after the country recorded a high number of infected cases.

It has been announced a ban on traffic to and from and the 19 states that are most affected by the outbreak of Corona virus, and the ban includes private cars. In addition to banning public and private transportation on the weekend only, with intensive sterilization of the streets and markets several times a day, and deporting doctors of suspended institutions to work in exchange for material rewards if necessary. And granting licenses to all government and private laboratories to conduct analyzes on "Covid-19", to relieve pressure on the Pasteur Institute and its annexes in the states, and to strengthen the capabilities of the permanent stock of examination and detection tools and oxygen and follow it daily at the level of each state.

Were there a lockdown in your country? What did/do you in this time?

Yes, there were a lockdown for 4 months (April-July). At that time I was learning new skills and taking different online courses to enhance my existed knowledge because we had a large time.

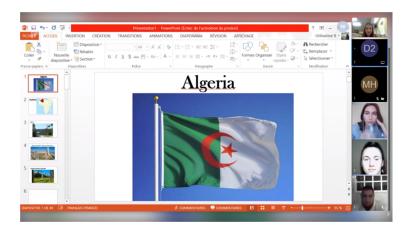
How has your daily life changed since the outbreak of the pandemic?

Resume

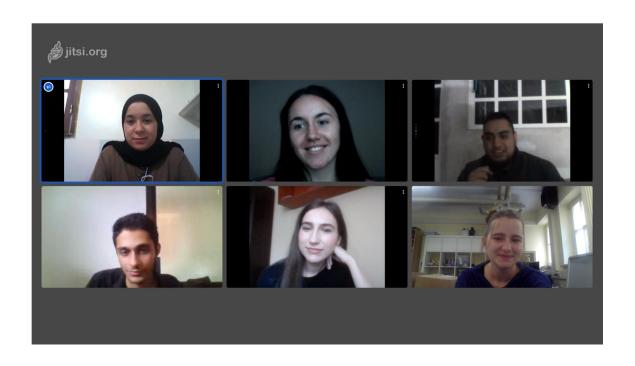
